







 A: A richman who spends his time enjoying himself.

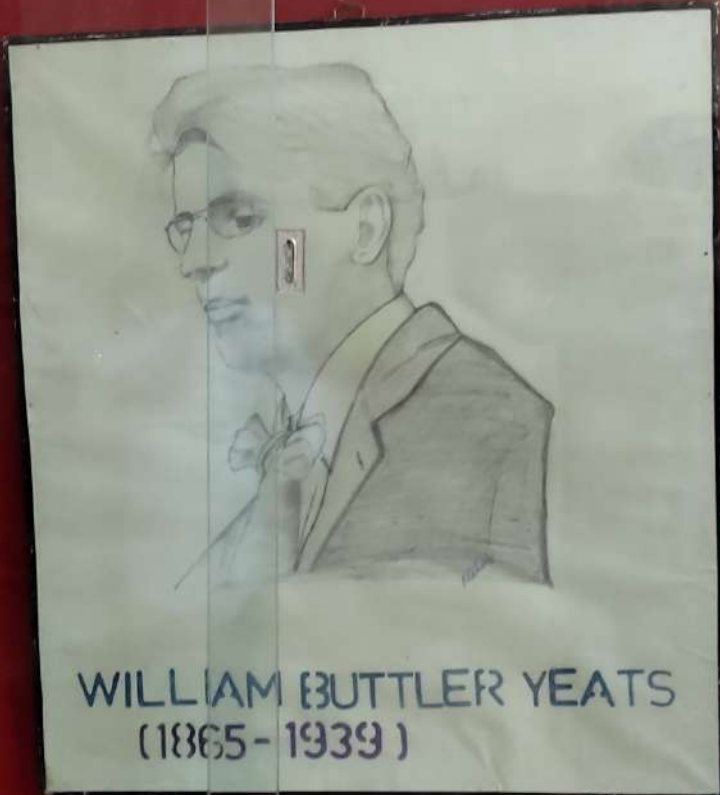
Compare High-tall

Q. What is a 'Tirade'?
